About AIIM

Angel Island represents the complex history of American immigration. Many immigrants came during periods of exclusion. Others came when reforms led to greater opportunities. All arrived with dreams of a better life.

The Angel Island Immigration Museum (AIIM) invites you to discover the stories, hopes, and struggles of Pacific Coast immigrants, as well as the policies that impacted them.

History of the Hospital

The U.S. Public Health Service (PHS) provided medical inspections and care at the immigration station from 1910 to 1940.

Immigrants who were found to have a treatable condition like trachoma or hookworm would be sent to the USIS hospital to receive medical treatment at their own expense.

These immigrants made up the overwhelming majority of the 1,000 or so patients who were admitted to the USIS hospital each year.

Historic Preservation

Inscriptions and drawings were removed from the walls of the Japanese Men's Ward and preserved off-site.

The room is now marked **Special Exhibit** on the map.





Among the drawings were a pencil sketch of a bird and rooster carving.


Future of AIIM
